Their names were Esther and Bill and they were our back door neighbors when I was about five years old. It was not a rich neighborhood. As a matter of fact, most of our neighbors (and us) were on the poor side. You know the kind, hard working, responsible people, always short of cash, but then, that was acceptable because there was a depression going on.

We were the “Fortunates”. Both Dad and Uncle Bill (as I called him) had jobs; Dad as a mail carrier and Uncle Bill as a cab driver, not lucrative jobs during the depression, but steady enough to put food on the table – a remarkable feat in those days.

Uncle Bill was a quiet but congenial man; short, squat and with a face that was always wreathed in smiles. He may have been quiet and lovable, but Aunt Esther was something else – large, boisterous, gregarious and voluptuous! She dominated any scene with her presence. She was not fearful, just a volatile, fun loving person given to a lot of colorful language, most of which was sprinkled with four letter expletives (which I was never allowed to use).

Their house being right across the alley from us was a great convenience for me. I could visit them whenever I chose, and I was always welcome. Sunday was always a special treat for me because Aunt Esther would usually have some kind of goodie for me and claimed she needed my expert opinion before she could serve it to Uncle Bill or any

expected guests.

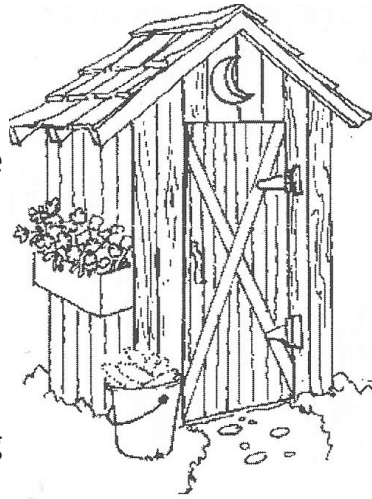
No doubt influenced by the Saturday night bucket of beer they were both so fond of, Dad and Uncle Bill decided to improve their lots in life by adding additions to their houses; Dad to build a much needed living/dining room to ours, and Uncle Bill to build an attached garage to the back of theirs. The only problem was, the outhouse was in the way. Outhouses were still a necessity in the area at the time, although they were on their way out. Small as our house was, we were lucky to have inside plumbing. Undaunted, Uncle

Bill built his garage around the outhouse! A short wall surrounded the commode, covering just the lower portion of his body.

My Sunday morning treats thereafter always conjured up the picture of Uncle Bill ensconced on this throne, with just his head and the top of his newspaper visible as I made my usual trek to their house for my expected goodies. He would peek over the top of his newspaper, solemnly

bid me “Good Morning,” wink and throw me the comics for Aunt Esther to read to me. Uncle Bill was not particularly frugal. He left any financial juggling to Aunt Esther; but when her birthday approached, he went out of his way to set aside every extra penny he could. As the special day approached, he had saved the princely sum of \$20.00 – no mean task in those days, and a veritable fortune by the standards of all working class people.

Beans and hot dogs were the limit of Esther's culinary skills. No frills or baking for her! Even my Sunday treats consisted of Jell-O or



pudding with fruit or cookie crumbs mixed in, which suited me fine! And so, Uncle Bill had the perfect hiding place for Esther's birthday money – the never used oven in their kitchen stove! Ideal! Then one especially cold Sunday morning in early November caused Aunt Esther to light the oven to rid the house of that damp chill, rather than start up the pot-bellied stove in the corner of their living room. It was just as I was coming into the garage with its inside outhouse that Uncle Bill smelled the smoke coming through the open kitchen door into his special domain. I was greeted with a loud bellow. "NO ...NO!" as Uncle Bill, realizing what was happening, barreled out of his privy's sanctuary clad only in his half-mast underpants and raced to the kitchen stove – TOO LATE! The \$20.00 was reduced to expensive ashes. It's the first time I ever saw a grown man weep.
